Equine Tapeworm Testing

Up until recently, the only way to tell if a horse had a large amount of tapeworm was by a blood sample. However, recently there has been a great innovation in developing a saliva based test. This offers a number of good advantages - not least in that it's a really accurate way of diagnosing whether a horse has a current high tapeworm burden or not. The sample is easy to take, you need to just withhold food from your horse for half an hour and then rub the sample swab on his tongue until enough saliva has been collected. 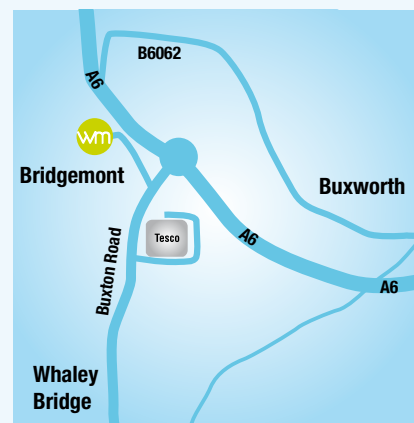

Investigating reduced performance

A large part of what we do at Wright & Morten is helping horses to perform at their best. We understand how frustrating it can be when your horse is not achieving its full potential and have many methods of investigating and treating reduced performance. Such problems are often multifactorial and many of our veterinary surgeons and nurses may be involved in establishing a diagnosis and implementing treatment.

Why does my horse need to go to Somerford Park for investigations?



Some procedures can certainly be done on farm but for investigating poor performance Somerford Park has several advantages, including:

- The environment is safer for the horse, handler and veterinary surgeon
- Our equine veterinary nurses are experienced in assisting with the procedures that we perform to ensure that they are as safe as possible and reduce the amount of time required for procedures.
- Many vets with different interests can examine your horse. For example a horse which is exhibiting signs of gastric ulcers maybe also be experiencing orthopaedic pain or dental discomfort; diagnosing and managing each underlying problem gives the best chance of a full recovery.
- Somerford Park offers several surfaces upon which lameness may be detected, either in hand, on the lunge or under saddle. Our nurses have had lots of practice and can encourage even the most tricky horses to lunge beautifully!
- Regions of the head, limbs, neck and back can be desensitised using local anaesthetic in clean conditions with expert horse handling to reduce the risk of complications. Some local anaesthetic blocks require time to take effect and our team can investigate several cases at one time in the practice.
- Within the clinic we can control the environment, making it easier to ensure sterility, store temperature - controlled medications and use less portable

equipment. This includes a powerful X-Ray machine to image backs and necks, the gastroscope and clinic ultrasound scanner.

- We have in house laboratory equipment and on site processing of samples, this is particularly useful for regenerative medicine treatments such as IRAP or PRP. One of the labs that we frequently use collects samples directly from the clinic.
- Our stables provide facilities to starve horses overnight when required, prior to general anaesthesia or medical investigations.
- The sturdy stocks provide safe restraint for horses who are difficult to inject or require long procedures under standing sedation.
- Farriers, physiotherapists and sports massage therapists can be arranged to visit the clinic as part of your horses treatment.
- We provide facilities for general anaesthesia and have specialist surgeons visiting the clinic most weeks.



And of course there is a tack shop & café!
